Annual Election Coming Up June 12

The annual election meeting of the Royal Rosarians will take place Thursday, June 12 at the Stafford Woods Conference Center in Wilsonville. Social hour is at 4:30, dinner is at

6:15.

This year there are 12 candidates for nine open positions on Council. There are two candidates for Secretary of State.

All Rosarians must register at the voting table to receive their ballot. Once completed the ballots are to be placed in the ballot box. Vote for a maximum of nine candidates for Council. A ballot with more than nine selections for Council will not be counted. Similarly, each ballot must indicate a maximum selection of two candidates for the Foundation Board positions. This first ballot voting will end at 6:30 p.m. and ballots will be counted immediately thereafter. As was carried out for the first time last year, Rosarians will vote for Council and Foundation candidates at the outset, but not candidates for the Secretary of State position. After the the initial votes are tallied, a separate ballot will then be distributed for the Secretary of State position. (This change, which resulted from an interpretation of the Edict last year, addresses a concern voiced in past years that no votes for Secretary of State candidates are "wasted" because the SOS candidate failed to get elected to Council, which is a qualification to be Secretary of State.)

Those who attend the Election meeting only for the purpose of voting will want to plan to remain in attendance after the Council election at 6:30 so that they can vote in the Secretary of State election after the Council ballots are counted.

For new Rosarians, the person elected Secretary of State in June is then in line to become our 2017 Prime Minister.

Keep in mind that there is no proxy voting and no absentee voting. You must be present to vote.

Also at this meeting will be the election of two Rosarians to the Board of Directors of our Rosarian Foundation. There are three candidates for these two positions and their submitted information is set forth below. Remember: all Rosarians are members of the Royal Rosarian Foundation and are entitled to vote.

Immediately below is information submitted by each candidate. The questions were put to Council and Secretary of State candidates by Royal Regent Gayle Whitehurst, who chairs the Nominating Committee. The Foundation question was put to Board candidates by Foundation President Gordon Walker. The submissions of each candidate have not been edited; they are printed as submitted. The photos below of Rosarian candidates were submitted by the candidates (or, if a candidate didn't submit a photo, the Royal Regent may have used the Roster photo).

The first two candidates are running for Secretary of State (Stahl and Wolcott, in alphabetical order) as well as for re-election to Council. Following these two candidates are the other 10 candidates for Council. Remember that there are nine positions on Council for which these 12 candidates are running.

Below the Council candidates are the three candidates for two positions on the Foundation board.

Candidates for Secretary of State and Rosarian Council



Sir Knight Jim Stahl

As the leader of the Royal Rosarians, how will you get the membership more involved? I.E., attending events, participating in out of towns, and serving on committees.

I was in charge of Hospitality in 2011, Exchequer in 2012, New Membership in 2014, involved with 42 committees and chaired 8 of them. I've had a great opportunity to get to know the inner-workings of our organization and its outstanding volunteers. This knowledge in addition to my previous experience as chairman of the board of a large trade association has taught me how to get more members involved. At my previous leadership positions my focus was to get more people involved and reduce the workload for others. It's a careful balance and you need to respect those that do so much. I did this by getting newer members involved with smaller projects and having seasoned members taking on the lead roles, the organization, and coordinating the FUN!! The newer members get involved but the focus is to meet others, learn the ropes, and be part of a successful process.

How would you describe Leadership?

Leaders are helpers, motivators, delegators, and direction setters. Great leaders of a voluntary organization are aware of the members' needs and help to nourish them. The leader must be honest, have respect for all, be passionate and be focused on the organization. Leadership isn't something you are given, you earn it!

I have found this to be true early-on being part of various Royal Rosarian committees. Over the years I have attended 32 out-of-towners, served on nearly every committee for Hospitality weekend, and been part of; Newsmakers, Honorary Knighting, Finance, Centennial, Foundation, VIP Greetings, Blessing of the Festival, Drillmasters. I know firsthand how to properly lead this organization.

What Knowledge, Skills and Abilities do you have that will benefit the Council?

Over the past eight years, Geneane and I have enjoyed being part of various committees and working with others. I bring to the council my knowledge of the

inter-workings of the organization, a family history through my grandfather, my love for the organization, and an appreciation for the incredible talents and passions of the Rosarians and our spouses. This appreciation is seen in every position I am given to oversee. As the Council of new membership I continue to improve the flow of information to the new members.

Biographical Information

I have a strong history with the Royal Rosarians. My Grandfather was a Rosarian from 1949 to 1987. My Aunt was the office secretary for the RFA and my Grandmother was a member of the Rose Society.

For the past 35 years I have worked for Pacific Power and I am currently a Principal Engineer. I was elected to the board of directors of an international trade association in 1993 and in 2003 the membership elected me to Chairman of the Board. As chair I was able to start a mentoring program that was successful in creating future leadership and growth for the organization.

In 1988 I was elected to chair an annual Christmas food baskets program. We went from 37 families / 50 volunteers to last year 143 families / 350 volunteers serving over 500 boxes of food. The involvement is growing every year as people come to have fun and work together.

As the leader of the Royal Rosarians, how will you get the membership more involved? I.E., attending events, participating in out of towns, and serving on committees.

As I stated at the May 22 membership meeting, my main goal as Prime Minister will be to focus on the satisfaction level of the membership. I believe the members in a volunteer organization would want to participate in the activities of the organization. I think that by participating, the members would achieve a higher level of satisfaction, largely due to the enjoyment that is created when our members interact with one another. I would like to ask the membership to increase their level of satisfaction by participating in one additional committee and by attending one additional event. An increase of participation will lead us to a successful year, and a successful year often leads to a satisfied membership.

How would you describe Leadership?

Leadership has been defined as either a group or an individual that is committed to seeing that a common goal be accomplished for the greater good of the majority. In regards to the Royal Rosarians, that means that, once a common objective has been decided upon, the committee responsible for achieving that objective works together to determine a course of action that will bring about the desired result. The leadership, who helped frame the goal, should support the efforts of the committee(s), encouraging participation and cooperation. It should not be up to the leadership to accomplish these goals themselves. Rather, the leadership should look to assist their committees, offering guidance and support as needed.

I first learned about leadership from my father. He was a high school teacher and coach. In that capacity, he obviously could not do the work for his students and athletes. I witnessed how he was able to work with a broad variety of young people, helping them to achieve their anticipated success and results. I learned at an early age how to be supportive and encouraging. I have carried that message of leadership with me through my academic, athletic, professional and personal lives.

I cherish my role as a leader of the Royal Rosarians and hope to serve the organization in that capacity for many years to come.

What Knowledge, Skills and Abilities do you have that will benefit the Council?

Many of the skills I have learned in my 35 years of selling professionally are easily transferable to a position on Council. Over the years, I have learned to: speak and act decisively, know when to talk and when to listen, immediately discern fluff from substance, seek counsel from those with greater knowledge of a certain topic, and work for the benefit of my client. How would you describe Leadership?

It would be an honor and a pleasure to serve on the Rosarian Foundation in its service on behalf of the Royal Rosarians.


Sir Knight John Santos
